Finding Articles EBSCO (for Humanities - American Studies, Art, Music, Philosophy, Theology & Religion)

Bibliographical databases are the best tools for locating journal articles, book reviews, collections of essays and conference proceedings even if you don't know the authors or article title. The EBSCO service hosts a number of key bibliographic databases in the Humanities including:

- America: History & Life
- Art Full Text (including Art Abstracts)
- ATLA Religion Database with ATLASerials Plus
- Historical Abstracts
- MLA International Bibliography
- Old Testament Abstracts
- New Testament Abstracts
- Philosopher's Index
- RILM Abstracts of Music Literature

Connecting to EBSCO and choosing database(s)

 Go to SOLO (<u>http://solo.bodleian.ox.ac.uk</u>) and search for one of the databases above (e.g. ATLA). Once you have found the online version click **Online access** to connect.

Alternatively, go to Databases A-Z (<u>https://libguides.bodleian.ox.ac.uk/az.php</u>) and search for one of the databases above (e.g. ATLA). Follow the link to connect.

 Note, if you want to search more than one database at once (e.g. ATLA plus Philosophers index) you can add the extra database after you have connected to EBSCO by clicking "choose databases" (above the search box).

Searching EBSCO

3. Look at the search terms that you came up with in the "Building a search" exercise earlier and work out how to use the terms you identified in EBSCO.

Here is an example on the topic of the ordination of women priests in the Catholic church.

- What key concepts did you identify in the "Building a search exercise"? In EBSCO it is easiest to put each distinct concept on a separate line in the search form, e.g. in the example above the key concepts are women, ordination and catholic.
- If you identified synonyms or alternatives words for your search terms enter these on the same line in the search form and add OR in between them, e.g. ordination OR priest.
- To find alternative word endings use * e.g. Catholic* finds Catholic, Catholics, Catholicism.
- To search for an exact phrase use "quotation marks". This is suitable for words which have a particular meaning when they are used together e.g. "old testament", "immaculate conception", "poor law", "world war II", " logical truth" etc.
- In EBSCO it is worth considering using the Select a Field drop down menus to limit your search to SU Subject. This will search for articles where your keywords are included as part of the subject description. These articles are likely to be relevant to your topic. If you do not choose a field, EBSCO will search all the information that it has about each article (including in some cases the full text). This will return more articles, but they are less likely to be relevant to your topic.
- Use the options in the bottom half of the screen to limit your search as appropriate e.g. to peer reviewed journals or by publication date. Some EBSCO databases also have special options for particular subjects e.g. limit by historical period in Historical Abstracts.

Look through your search results

If you have too many results:

- try adding more keywords to make your search more specific.
- limit you search to a particular publication period or to peer reviewed articles only using the options in the bottom half of the screen.

If you have too few results:

- try removing some of your search terms or search for a broader topic.
- Instead of choosing subjects from the select a field drop down menu, leave this option blank (i.e. so it reads Select a Field). This will instruct EBSCO to search all the information it has for each article and may return some extra items.

Please feel free to ask one of the staff for help with searching.

Working with your results

Once you have found an article that interests you:

4. Click on the title to see more information including an abstract (where available) and subjects. It's worth looking at the subjects as this can help you to identify more keywords to include in your search next time. For example, after viewing the results below we might decide to modify the search to include the word 'deacon' (e.g. ordination OR priest OR deacon). You can also click on the subjects to see all items on the topic in the database. However, it's often more effective to note down the subject terms and then add them to your own keywords.

5. **Email** the article to yourself or **Export** it to a reference management package such as Endnote or RefWorks using the options on the right.

Note, to email or export several items at once: for each item click the blue folder icon in the results screen to add them to a folder. Then choose 'Folder' at the top of the screen.

6. To find the full text click 'Find it @ Oxford'. You will be taken to SOLO, which will display the item's details. Depending on the availability of the text, you will be given options to read the PDF online or find a print copy of the item in the Bodleian Libraries.

Using the Thesaurus

- 7. Many EBSCO databases also include a Thesaurus. Using the Thesaurus is similar to using the 'Browse' option in SOLO and can be a useful way of finding items (in particular, surfacing items which haven't used the keywords you expected). Click on **Thesaurus** (top of screen) and enter one of your search concepts into the search box and click 'browse'.
- 8. Once you have found a useful subject in the thesaurus, tick the check box next to the term and click 'Add'. This will add it to the search box at the top of the page. Click 'Search' at the top of the page to search the database on that topic. Alternatively, to combine more than one subject heading in the thesaurus, tick a subject and then choose an option from the OR/AND/NOT drop down. Then select another subject and click Search at the top of the screen. Note, if you want items which include both of the selected subjects use AND, but if you want items which include one or other of the subjects (or both) click OR.
